Be Thou My Vision

Scripture Reading:

I repeat, let no one think me foolish. But even if you do, accept me as a fool, so that I too may boast a little. What I am saying with this boastful confidence, I say not as the Lord would but as a fool. Since many boast according to the flesh, I too will boast. For you gladly bear with fools, being wise yourselves! For you bear it if someone makes slaves of you, or devours you, or takes advantage of you, or puts on airs, or strikes you in the face. To my shame, I must say, we were too weak for that!

But whatever anyone else dares to boast of—I am speaking as a fool—I also dare to boast of that. Are they Hebrews? So am I. Are they Israelites? So am I. Are they offspring of Abraham? So am I. Are they servants of Christ? I am a better one—I am talking like a madman—with far greater labors, far more imprisonments, with countless beatings, and often near death. Five times I received at the hands of the Jews the forty lashes less one. Three times I was beaten with rods. Once I was stoned. Three times I was shipwrecked; a night and a day I was adrift at sea; on frequent journeys, in danger from rivers, danger from robbers, danger from my own people, danger from Gentiles, danger in the city, danger in the wilderness, danger at sea, danger from false brothers; in toil and hardship, through many a sleepless night, in hunger and thirst, often without food,^[10] in cold and exposure. And, apart from other things, there is the daily pressure on me of my anxiety for all the churches. Who is weak, and I am not weak? Who is made to fall, and I am not indignant?



And so, the new year is upon us. We look over our shoulders for a rearview glimpse of the past year, we find ourselves already immersed in the moment and we look ahead to what might be. There's an old saying I heard that went something like this: Don't dwell in the past, don't live in the future, stay in the present.

Which is all well and good. But our past is our history, and we can't just ignore it. From our past we carry fond memories and lessons learned. We build upon those who have gone before us, relying on their wisdom and guidance. And as for the future, it is the promise of things to come – like the second coming of Christ – that brings hope to our present day. We plan for the future. We save for retirement. Without a doubt, the past and the future are important to us. But we *live* in the moment. The past and the future may help direct us but we don't live there.

In 2 Corinthians 11, Paul shares with the church the many ways he has suffered as an apostle: imprisonment, beatings with rods, whipped within an inch of his life, stoned, shipwrecked, danger from robbers and even his own people. Sleepless, hungry, thirsty, in cold and exposure... Let's not bother with the question, *why* would someone go through all of this? Instead, let's ask, *how* could someone go through all of this and keep on going? It's simple. Because the promise of hope resides upon him. Hope fulfilled in Jesus Christ – his death and resurrection. Christ's promise to eternal life. And a recognition that the suffering Paul is going through here on earth is as nothing compared to an eternal life with Jesus in God's kingdom.

From the past Paul is guided to share the Good News with others as Jesus commanded. In the present Paul suffers in doing so. In the future is Paul's salvation. It is a promise of Christ that those who believe in him shall accompany him in heaven. Paul is living into Christ's promise.

Lord, bless us that we always live according to your will. Amen

To the parents of young children:
