And behold, a lawyer stood up to put him to the test, saying, "Teacher, what shall I do to inherit eternal life?" He said to him, "What is written in the Law? How do you read it?" And he answered, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength and with all your mind, and your neighbor as yourself." And he said to him, "You have answered correctly; do this, and you will live."

But he, desiring to justify himself, said to Jesus, "And who is my neighbor?" 

I've always been fascinated with math. But don't confuse fascination with expertise. When I was pastor of New Bethel in Scottsville KY a church member of mine was also a teller at the bank I went to. I went in one day and filled out the deposit/withdraw slip and handed it over to the teller right next to her. My church member, in the meantime, was telling her that I was her pastor.

This teller looked at the slip I had handed to her and exclaimed; "this isn't right! Your math is all wrong." My church member looked at her and said, "I said he could preach! I never said he could add."

When I look at math today, and the homework my daughter does, I am flummoxed, baffled, intrigued and in awe. How does this work? That can't be. That doesn't add up to what I think it should. It's beyond me!

I find this to be true with God's math as well. One man speaks before a multitude. He shares some words and thousands come to accept Christ as savior and Lord. That doesn't add up.

Jesus takes a few loaves of bread and some fish and feeds thousands of people with much left over. Huh?

Experienced fishermen fish all night and catch nothing. Jesus comes along and says – drop your nets there. The fisherman says, we've been casting our nets there all night. No fish to be had. But he does it anyway. Their nets are filled to overflowing – almost capsizing the boat. This doesn't add up.

One man goes to the cross, Jesus Christ. And the sum of all our sins are forgiven - by one man's love. By God's love. It doesn't add up, I am flummoxed, baffled, intrigued. I am in awe. Jesus loves you this I know...

NOTES:

WELCOME! To the parents of young children:

Relax! God put the wiggle in children; don't feel you have to suppress those wiggles in God's house.

- Consider sitting toward the front where it is easier for your little ones to engage.
- Quietly explain the parts of the service and the actions of the pastors, musicians and leaders.
