Additional Text:

1 Peter 3:18-20 Acts 2:27, 31 John 20:11-18

Where was Jesus between the hour of his death and the morning of day three when those who loved him saw him again? His body was entombed and guarded over by Roman soldiers. The reader of the Creed understands Jesus no longer stands in the land of the living by the words following his crucifixion: *dead*, *and buried*. But what about his Living Spirit?

No other statement in the Creed raises near the amount of uncertainty as does, "he descended into Hell." Some congregations keep these words in the written and prayed Apostles' Creed. Some do not.

Why is this one article so widely argued and variously interpreted while every other article is accepted by Christians and clearly sustained by Scripture?

Sheol, the Old Testament word for hell, was used in two contexts. Sometimes it meant the grave or realm of the dead. At other times it meant the place where the wicked go and are punished.

In the New Testament the word hell is used to translate two entirely different Greek words ~ *Hades* and *Gehenna*. *Gehenna* was the name of the valley right outside of Jerusalem where living sacrifices were made and refuse was burned. *Hades* meant the "unseen" or the realm of the dead.

1 Peter 3:18-20 tells us that Jesus "went and preached unto the spirits in prison". This can also be widely interpreted; however, I believe this points to Jesus being engaged in ministry on behalf of those for whom he died.

Prayer: Help my faith to grow stronger. Let me believe, Lord. *Amen*.
