From Pastor Patrick:



In a few weeks I'll launch a new sermon series. While I have an overarching theme already in place, I had at one time thought to call the series: "I Am the One." From there I immediately

thought of Jesus Christ, naturally, right? After all, the Gospel of John reveals numerous "I am" statements from Jesus.

I am the way; I am the door; I am the light of the world, the bread of life, the way, the truth, the life, the good shepherd, the gate for the sheep...

This series centers on the parable Jesus tells which we find in Luke 15 and Matthew 18 – the parable of the lost sheep. We remember that one of the 100 strong flock of sheep gets itself lost. And the shepherd leaves the 99 to go seek the one. So, when I say "I am the one" I'm not thinking about being the best, being the greatest, being "number 1!" I'm thinking, I'm the one who got lost. I'm the one who needs help. I'm the wondering, floundering, in need of help – one. And I'm so glad the Good Shepherd came to find me.

As I sussed this out in my head and my prayers, I realized there is significant importance not only for the one, but for the 99 as well. What compelled the shepherd to feel it's ok to leave 99% of his flock for the 1%? What would they do in his absence? How would they stay together ~ remaining found and not lost? How had the shepherd prepared the 99 to be ok while he was looking for the lost one?

Facebook is not a place that I tend to post to regularly, When I do it's with great intention ~ I want the message to be felt and understood for what it is and not misconstrued for something else. Occasionally I will scroll through various posts to see what's happening in the lives of friends and family. For better or for worse, this is where I often "catchup" with what's newsworthy. I have been blessed to know pastors, ministry leaders, musicians, and academic professors throughout the US and in various parts of the world.

Pastor Juan who began a Latino Latina church ministry in Milwaukee before being called to Florida where he currently serves. In addition to his church, he is also aa chaplain at Grace Medical Home. Retired clergy and friend who lives in Canada, John. Christal, a pastor and

professor in Germany. Then there is Garrett – one of the brightest young men I know. He serves the Presbyterian church in California. He is humble and at times self-deprecating. He will post, at times, concerns and worries: of people, of church, of family, of himself – himself more than any of the others.

They all post to Facebook and since I can't visit them or sit down with them, our connection is through FB messages.

While that is mainly positive, there are numerous posts of people crying out for help. Sometimes they look like angry posts or even petulant posts; nevertheless, I see them as cries for help. Loneliness, fear, depressed, worried and anxious... you can read this in their posts. Having a place to cry out is important. We don't want that bottled up inside of us or taken out on our spouse, or children, or parents. Especially for those who don't have a church home – where do they go?

There is a place in our Bible where "posts, cries and laments" are written. It's the book of Lamentations ~ found directly after Jeremiah. It begins with a lament for Jerusalem's suffering. "Oh no! She sits alone, the city that was once full of people. Once great among nations, she has become like a widow. Once a queen over provinces she has become a slave." (Lam. 1:1)

The excruciation of her suffering is proclaimed loudly, with weeping and gnashing of teeth. "She weeps bitterly in the night... her tears on her cheek... all her friends lied to her; they have become her enemies." (Lam. 1:2)

I've heard this cry before. From those whom I've counseled. I don't think there is a worse feeling than to feel alone. Is it possible to feel lonely and alone in city filled with people? Of course, it is. Is it possible to feel like you had it all and were on top of the world? Sure – just ask someone recently widowed or divorced. Sometimes divorce can lead one to feel like all my friends are gone – they lied to me – now it seems that instead of friends, what I really had were frenemies.

Where do we go with this expulsion of feelings, confusion, rage, or fear? There are better places than Facebook. My go to answer is to talk with God. Rage at him if you will. He can take it. Cry on his shoulders, they are broad and sturdy. Punch a pillow while imagining you've just punched God in the chest and know he is holding you closely while you wear yourself out sobbing.

Take it to God. Take it to your pastor – he or she is there for you. Your church is a good place to go, just to sit in the pews (non-Sunday mornings) when no one is there. And to let it all out. You will be neither condemned nor denounced. You are a child of God and God loves you.

Soup-er Bowl Sunday

February 13th, the Super Bowl will be played out determining the top NFL team. While the top team can (and usually does) change from year to year, our Lord God never changes.

And our God knows we can't always do it on our own. So, he instructs those who love him to help care for one another. Hebrews puts it like this: "God is not unjust; he will not forget your work and the love you have shown him as you have helped his people and continue to help them."

In July, our mission team is joining with others on a trip to Knoxville TN to do just that – helping others in need. This team of missionaries: Anna Marie Bramstedt; Olivia Bramstedt; Sierra Bramstedt; Pastor Patrick will be leaving on the 15/16th and returning on the 22/23rd.

To support your missionaries we will have a "Soup-er" Bowl Sunday, during the regular morning worship services, where you can bring cans/boxes of soup which will collected by our confirmation class and taken to SCIO when they are on a scheduled tour of the facility.

We would also ask you to bring a donation (\$5, \$10, or free will gift) which will go to the mission cost of the trip.


