A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR PATRICK:

On Saturday, April 22nd, I attended the Northeast Association annual meeting at Daycholah. I am grateful for an understanding congregation that not only supports my time away but encourages me to go away. Wait a minute. That didn't come out right.

Daycholah (on Green Lake) is the new home office of the conference. The conference recently sold their building in Deforest and moved just in time for the annual meeting. It is indeed a beautiful location – ideal for retreats, camping, conference meetings...

We were blessed to have two excellent keynote speakers for the day. The first was Rev. Dr. Stephanie Perdew of the Cherokee Nation who is also the new director for the Minnesota-Wisconsin Damascus Project. You can find more information about her at: [Rev. Our other speaker, Rebecca Edler, is the Sustainability Coordinator at the Sustainable Development Institute at the College of Menominee Nation. You can find out more about her at: [Staff, Faculty, & Team Members - College of Menominee Nation](#)

Both spoke of their tribes and the sustainable efforts to maintain the land, clean air, and clean water. I left the conference meeting feeling that there is a lot more for me to learn about and to do in regard to their topics.

The business of the day went well. New officers and team members were elected to a variety of district level committees. And while there are a few more gaps to fill, everything is looking very good. Interestingly enough, all 53-54 UCC churches in our district were represented on Saturday. I understand this hasn't happened in a while. There was a special mention of St. Mark's who was one of only 7-8 churches who qualified in their support of the greater ministry for 5 For 5 Churches.

The budget for last year (2022) was met and the proposed budget for 2024 approved. It should be noted that Jane Anderson spoke to our declining churches and numbers, which of course result in lower financial amounts to conference ministries and support. There is greater interest for more and more churches to explore a shared ministry [essentially yoking one pastor to two or more churches] than ever before.

She also spoke of the importance of churches ensuring their membership rolls are accurate. In other words, ensure the people you have on your membership list are active and participative (with obvious exceptions for shut-ins, very elderly, infirmed...) The amount churches are asked to give to (or pledge to) the conference is based on the number of members on the church's membership list. As membership declines the needed amount to meet the budget is spread across the other churches. If a church has 10 – 20 – 30 (fill in the number) on the member rolls that are not actually active, that overall number is calculated and is the basis for all churches' conference giving expectations.

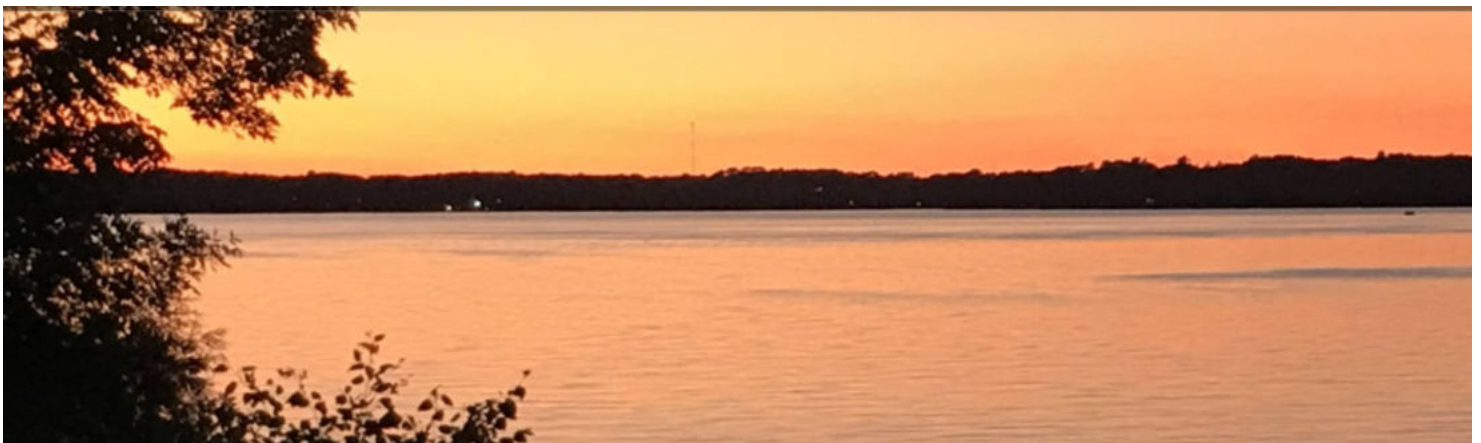
So, if (let's say) 20-25% of the churches across the conference have inaccurate membership rolls, all the churches will be paying a higher rate to make up the difference.

Lastly, from a personal point of perspective. Some of you know that I tend to find large meetings, conferences, and so on – not very worthwhile. There are a hundred other things I can think of doing that would make better use of my time. However, this annual meeting was very well done. It started on time, it ended on time, the speakers were very engaging, and the material easy to follow. The meeting was held in the chapel overlooking Green Lake. A more beautiful vista is hard to imagine. The greeters and helpers were great. The food served was very good. And I was able to reconnect with a number of my colleagues I haven't seen in a while.

All in all, a good weekend!

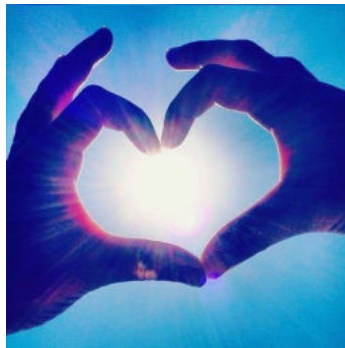

This year, Memorial Day is on Monday May 29, 2023, and will mark the seventy-seventh year that the Wagner-Eberle-Sukawoty American Legion Post in St Nazianz has conducted military honors at local cemeteries to respect our Veterans. HIGH SCHOOL YOUTH GROUP

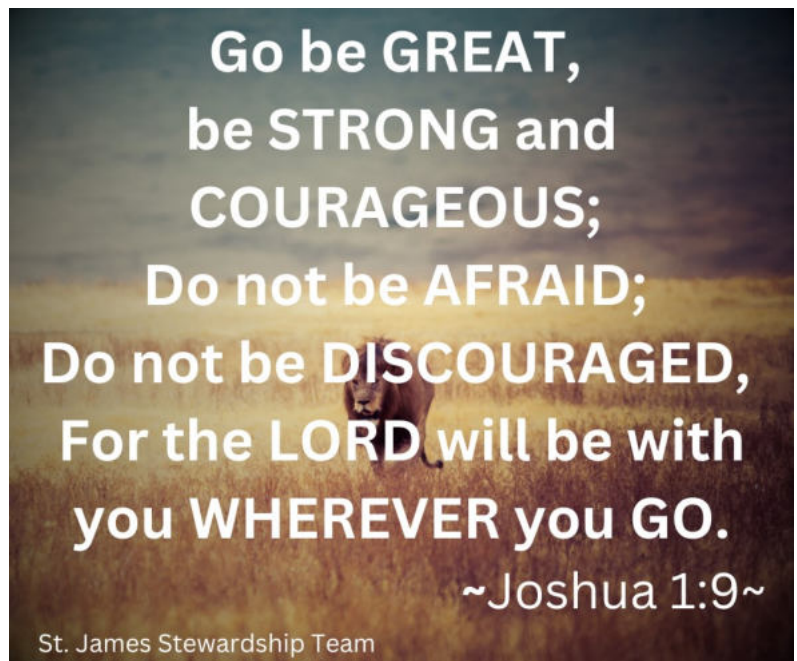
