

Below, you will find a description of the program.

The Church of Jesus Christ serves the Gospel, inspires disciples, and changes lives when its leaders are fully equipped, confident, and whole. The future of our congregations depends on the quality of faithful leadership provided by clergy and laypeople.

The Wisconsin Conference of the United Church of Christ connects, supports, and resources local congregations and leaders as they find creative and meaningful ways to live out the values of Jesus while helping our people recognize and embrace faithful change. The pandemic underscored this reality:

Leadership matters.

The Church requires investment in good leadership.

We must develop the next generation of lay leaders so the UCC can thrive into the future. Therefore, we invest in the Damascus Project.

The Damascus Project is a ministerial training track for those who feel called to Authorized Ministry but cannot attend seminary.

We must encourage creative new forms of ministry in our congregations and to advance our social justice work. Therefore, we invest in the Catalyst Grant program. This is a seed grant that supports emerging justice and community-based ministries.

We must ensure that those who serve our community as clergy are cared for in every season of their pastoral careers. Therefore, we invest in Ministerial Assistance.

The <u>Leadership Forward \$2 million campaign</u> aims to equip laypeople, clergy, and congregations with wisdom and skills to meet God's challenge to be the Church today and tomorrow.

Together, we can ensure our congregations continue to have high-quality, faithful leadership.



Dear St Mark's UCC Of Cleveland,

Gifts of congregations like yours to OCWM Basic Support make it possible for our Conference to support and strengthen local churches and leaders. We do this through programs like the recent ministerial retreats.

The "Woven Together" retreats took place on March 13 at Cedar Valley and March 18 at Siena Center in Racine. The gatherings provided a place for clergy to reconnect through contemplative prayer, creative engagement with one another through conversation and weaving, and Communion. Associated Conference Minister Rachel Bauman opened the retreat with an introduction to contemplative prayer, raising questions that people discussed throughout the retreat.

Dr. Shella Feay-Shaw of the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee engaged those in attendance in the experience of weaving. The activity centered on the idea of Jesus Christ as a weaver of people who searches out individuals who brought color to his "life-weaving." Like Jesus, we include in our life-weaving people with whom we don't agree. Some may regard people we include as "garish" because of some part of their story. People may leave, creating a hole in our life-weaving that may never be filled. Participants reflected on these ideas while creating a weaving together.

Pastors may worry about what people will think about their work. It can be uncomfortable. The weaving exercise presented similar challenges. Several individuals approached what we did with trepidation because they did not see themselves as "crafty," but as people got to talking and weaving a small piece of material into the common loom at the table, they found a sense of belonging, value and success. The clergy shared stories of their lives, their calling to ministry, and their joys and concerns in serving others.

Associate Conference Minister Jane Anderson closed the day with a celebration of Communion. "This was the first time in a very long time that I've been able to receive communion without having to be the host," one minister said.

Retreats like "Woven Together" provide vital nourishment to our pastors. "It was refreshment for the spirit," one pastor said. Thank you for the gifts of your congregation to OCWM Basic Support, which make support of leaders and congregations possible. A summary of your gifts to date for 2024 can be found below. 
