


### Thoughts from Pastor Patrick....

Have you ever, unexpectedly, come across something from your childhood that swept you back to those days of yore? Memories ~ perhaps imagery, aromas, sounds, feelings come flooding back and it's as if you stepped across a threshold into the past. 30-40-50-60... years ago.

Earlier this week I came across a book my wife had put on one of our bookshelves. I hadn't seen it in quite some time. I had only to glimpse the tattered, raggedy spine from a distance to know the book instantly. I gently took it off the shelf and held it tenderly in my hands. In large capital letters across the front were these words: PATRICK WILL GROW. In the lower right-hand corner of that front cover was a drawing of a tow-headed little boy walking along.

My mom got me this book as a birthday present when I was six years old. It tells the story of a little boy (also aged six!) who was woefully behind his growth spurt. Or so he thought. Throughout the story you'll see him eventually begin to grow.

He sleeps in the same bed as his brothers. On one side is Mike. On the other Tim. As he begins to grow, he pushes them out of the bed, until he needs his own bed. He's grown so big! Incidentally I have two brothers: Mike and Tim. The very last sentence in the book,



as he lies in bed at night thinking to himself that one day he would be as big as daddy and as wide as grandpa, when he would be a grown up, "Then where will I go? What will I do?"

So many connections with that book – the main character is Patrick. His brothers are Mike and Tim. Patrick is six years old. It might have been written about me. I have to admit the Bible has the same impact on me. It's a book I love to read. In it I find stories written about me. I find others familiar as brothers and sisters in those same stories. Ultimately, a question is asked and answered, "Where will I go? What will I do?" When I read these stories, emotions overwhelm me. Memories take me back to the first time I read about Adam and Eve, Noah, Abraham, Joseph, Peter, James, and John. Sampson and his stories of great strength take me back to my childhood when I ran around with my skinny boy arms held up in the typical "strongman" pose saying, "Look how strong I am! Look at my muscles!"

Or when I stood, with a hose causing a trickling stream to flow in front of me, arms raised with a long stick in one hand "parting the red sea." Or being a member of God's army fighting his enemies using sticks as swords, tin can garbage lids for shields, and dirt clumps for grenades. I have but to pick up that book and these memories and so many more come rushing back. Memories of a lifetime, flashing back in an instant. What a childhood. What an adulthood! I still find myself asking questions like, "Where will I go? What will I do?"

How can God use me? Where does God want me? What grand adventure will God lead me on next? These questions never stop, nor do they ever grow old. Our God is still speaking.

Mission Fest is November 12th with the traditional ham dinner. Janell will go to Gordon's in Green Bay to pick up food in bulk. A sign up sheet will be placed in the back of the church for other items needed. The October newsletter will list what individuals have signed up for. The price for the adult dinner will be \$15.00 and 12 and under will be \$5.00.

It was decided to return to serving communion in the pews beginning in October.

Thank you to Sandy and Larry Perronne for doing a great job cleaning up the yard around the church and parsonage. Very much appreciated!

Will continue to discuss the occupancy agreement at the next consistory meeting.

We will contribute \$100 to the United Churchmen and Women as we have done in past years.

Pastor Schultz and Brenda will be donating books to the church library in the fellowship hall.

We completed reviewing our membership list.

Our next consistory meeting will be held on October 11th at 6:30 p.m.

Larry made a motion to adjourn the meeting and Janell seconded the motion. Motion carried.

As of the date of this newsletter, duties still available are: dessert (pie, cake, or torte), salad (pasta, jello, or lettuce), one more gallon of milk, two more pounds of butter, sell tickets, cut and serve desserts, and beverage helpers.

A function like this cannot happen without our volunteers. Thank you for those who have already signed up. We will follow up next month with a final list of volunteers and details about the program.

### A LETTER FROM FRANZ RIGERT, UCC CONFERENCE MINISTER...



Dear friends.

In August, I tackled a backyard paver project, installing a flagstone patio around the deck. I had never taken on a stone project, so each step was a learn-as-you-go exercise. I began by digging out the dirt and replacing it with gravel, then compacted it with water and by hand-tamping, and topped the foundation with leveling sand. It took every flagstone -- 64 total -- and lots of spatial adjustments to complete the puzzle before sealing the in-between spaces with polymeric sand.

Projects are spiritual practices for me. They involve calculations and physical exertion, but also a freeing of the mind and a chance to rhythmically ponder the blessings and



challenges of life. A wise spiritual director taught me to embrace the notion that some of us encounter God's Spirit through repetitive movements.

The truth is, I find silent meditation dreadful. But in project spaces, where anxiety meets determination and assurance confronts doubt, I experience sacred companionship. Somehow the Spirit meets me in all the sweaty "sorting out" and settles my soul into a place of deep contentment. God's grace shows up in everyday projects, so it never feels as if I must go it alone.



I've been thinking lately about the Church as an ongoing paver project, recalling the many ways those early apostles had to "figure it out" with the guidance of the Holy Spirit. So, too, in the tumultuous days of the Protestant Reformation, our spiritual ancestors debated and deliberated and were led by the grace of God to pave new paths for an ancient Church.

Five hundred years later we find ourselves with more questions than answers. So many unknowns in this puzzling future of "project" Church. If

only we had a better sense of direction, instant Google answers, or clearer guidance from the Holy One, we could set our sights and get to work. But, as author Susan Beaumont suggests in her book "How to Lead When You Don't Know Where You're Going," this is a liminal season for the Church. In the same way some of the world's great cathedrals took hundreds of years to build, so too the full future of this rapidly changing Church may take several decades to unfold.

Meanwhile, we in the United Church of Christ remain faithful to God's unique calling upon our tradition – to welcome widely and love deeply, to be truth tellers and Gospel believers, to advocate for justice, and to respond generously to the needs of the poor and hurting. To lean forward.

These are tricky times, given the political and social tensions of our day. Yet each of us is like a solid paver in the great landscape of the Church. When we choose to make our platform all about the love of Jesus and the inclusion of the marginalized, we model a new way of living. And there are spiritual seekers out there who yearn to share this expression of faith alongside us.

So, as you prepare for a new program year, take heart and stay hopeful. In the words of the Apostle Paul: "Your labor is not in vain" (1 Corinthians 15:58). Take a <u>listen to this inspiring song</u> with the same title, sung by Paul Zach and published by Porter's Gate.

Now, a few brief updates:

Maui relief: We continue to encourage your special offerings in response to the devastating fires on Maui. **New general minister and president**: The Rev. Dr. Karen Georgia Thompson has now assumed her role as the new general minister and president of the UCC. Karen Georgia is an advocate for justice with a heart for the local church that welcomes the full spectrum of people in a big tent vision for the United Church of Christ.

Wisconsin Conference identity initiative: We are working on a logo, tagline and marketing collateral that convey the unique identity of the Wisconsin Conference of the United Church of Christ. We intend to develop the design starting this fall and eventually to make it available for your use, along with resources for inviting newcomers to your church.

Associational life: At a board and staff retreat two years ago, we began a conversation about the future of our four associations. We heard about the burden of sustaining a governance and committee structure that once served us well but now stretches fewer and fewer volunteers. We also heard about the many blessings in our associational life – supportive relationships, shared missions and collaborative ministries. This fall the board and staff will explore possible shifts that could preserve the blessing but relieve the burdens of our associational life. We anticipate wider conversations in the coming months and incremental steps toward what might be a more sustainable and life-giving middle judicatory model.

Conference office at Daycholah: The Conference staff has settled into our new digs at Daycholah Center and is enjoying our deepening partnership with the Daycholah staff. Much of the team works remotely except for monthly meetings, and the rest splits time between Daycholah and our home offices. In the coming month the Friedens bell will be delivered from the former Trost Center, and the sign (also brought from DeForest) will be hung along the road outside Spring Grove Lodge. That should complete the office transition. We welcome you for a visit!

Pension Boards transition to Fidelity Investments: This recordkeeping service transition for the UCC Pension Plan is underway and will be complete this month. It's important to note that current annuitants will not be affected by this change. Those who are still contributing will need to designate beneficiaries once the transition to Fidelity is complete. Everything else transfers automatically. Monthly statements will be available online, and if you want to receive a copy in the mail you will need to request that. You should have received the "Fidelity Recordkeeping Transition Guide," which contains details about the transition, key dates, and information on upcoming webinars that will help you get to know Fidelity and its many services.
