Restore Us

Restoration projects fascinate me. I grew up watching my dad restore antique furniture in his workshop. He would strip down the old layers, bring out the beauty of the natural grain of the wood and put on a protective coat of some finish – not hiding the natural beauty, but calling attention to it.

Growing up with dad as my role model, and eventually plying my hand at the trade, I learned to appreciate the hard work that goes into each stage of refinishing.

First and foremost is seeing the "piece" through the eyes of the creator, the carpenter, the builder... as a thing of beauty. Over the years that piece has been dinged up, scratched, notched, stained by spills and perhaps covered up with paint. One strives to remove the outer, ugly layers without damaging what lies under. One may try to keep the knocks, dings and dents accumulated over the years for they can often be worn as a badge of honor and can tell a story in and of themselves.

Then there is the sanding of the rough edges – sanding with finer and finer grains of sandpaper to ease out the scratches and bring to it new life. There may be a replacing of the old, discolored, beat up hardware with new – perhaps of shiny brass. And last is applying a shellac or varnish or lacquer to protect the appeal of the wood, prevent it from further damage and to make it look richer and deeper.

This is how I envision God at work in our lives. Rescuing, restoring, protecting us. Making us better and our lives richer and deeper. Praise be to God.

Prayer: Lord, may we be open to the improvements you make in and on our lives – even if the stripping and sanding is a bit painful. You are our Creator, Carpenter and Builder. We are in your hands now and always. *Amen*
