Immanuel Kant once wrote, "By a lie a man annihilates his dignity as a man."

Who among us can honestly say that we haven't lied – for good reasons? Who among us can say we live a truly good life? And who among us can say we treat everyone else as Jesus treated others With kindness, care, forgiveness, and grace, and too – love?

If our answer is, as it must be, I can't. That's not to say we shouldn't try. We should all continue to try to be the best we can be.

To escape the sins of our pasts. To be accepting of our little foibles and others.

We can't run away from who we are. As much as we might try we can't just forget who we are and what we've done. The accumulating burdens of past sins would soon have us hunched over, barely able to crawl under the ever-increasing weight.
